The event, benefiting Community and Caregiver programs, will include a private screening of "[Glen Campbell: I'll Be Me](#)," a powerful portrayal of the American Music icon's journey with Alzheimer's disease. "Glen chose to go public with his diagnosis in an attempt to de-stigmatize Alzheimer's disease," said Kim Campbell, Glen's wife. "It is astounding how many people are affected by this disease. It isn't just about losing your memory; it is a very long and difficult illness. Through our story we hope to increase awareness about the disease and efforts to find a cure."
